Ibie is an energetic, engaging, chatty boy, who is constantly commentating on life. However, his autism can make a lot of things extremely challenging for him.


Dougie is a handsome black Labrador who, according to Albie's mum Emma, has broken down the day-to-day barriers that made accessing life so difficult.

his year marks a decade since our Dementia Dog project was launched in collaboration with Alzheimer Scotland. The pilot project supported people with a dementia diagnosis and their partners being supported by a specially-trained dog, providing physical support, improving inclusion and reducing social isolation. Many people connected with the Dementia Dog project attended a celebration at the V&A Museum in

Dundee. Hearing first-hand from people we supported about the incredible difference that dogs had made to their loved ones made it a truly inspiring and emotional day.

Olivia, our Director of Income Generation, said: "It's difficult to put into words the emotional charge that ran through the tightly packed room that day. Pride in what had been achieved, remembering those who were no longer with us, but most of all an overwhelming sense of community and commitment."

Our Dementia Dog service has developed to support even more people living with dementia. New initiatives include community dogs working with individuals to reduce social isolation, increase confidence and maintain independence. We're also training volunteers and their pet dogs to hold 'Dog Days' in dementia support community groups - sessions that raise a smile amongst everyone who attends. We look forward to seeing where the next 10 years takes us.

# **Community Dog: Style Acre**

ur Community Dog service delivers support in a variety of ways using Animal Assisted Intervention (AAI) techniques. Our super-friendly dogs work with their handlers to help people with autism, dementia and learning disabilities improve their independence, wellbeing and skills.

One of the partners we work with is Style Acre in Banbury; a charity supporting people with learning disabilities and autism.

Dogs for Good's work with Style Acre spans some seven years and currently, the sessions take place once a week for a group of three people, typically over 10-12 weeks duration.

Style Acre's manager, Fiona Kearley says: "The Dogs for Good sessions are incredibly popular and hugely successful. The activities that the handlers create are great fun and create wonderful connections between individuals and groups that probably wouldn't otherwise have happened."

Assistant Manager, Stephanie says that the current group have all benefited hugely but the change for a lady called Jackie has been 'stand out'. "Prior to being involved in the Dogs for Good sessions, Jackie wasn't that confident," she says. "But in the past 11 weeks, she's got a newfound confidence and is much more likely to be assertive and speak up. I think it's because the activities with the dogs have given her a safe and positive way to practice being more confident."

Andrew and Theresa are part of the same group as Jackie. When asked what they love about working with Dogs for Good Community dog, Ursa, Andrew says 'Dog fantastic!" 'and Theresa says 'It's fantastic!' **Theresa loves** grooming Ursa as she finds it very relaxing and

both Andrew and Jackie love taking it in turns to hold Ursa's lead for walks into town with Ursa's handler. Fiona says "It's wonderful to be able to offer this service to the people we support and everyone looks forward to the dogs coming! The energy

"I have a progressive illness and the future is quite scary. But I know that Sherlock will stand beside me to face the challenges. He's everything to me and the changes he's made to my life are incredible. He's absolutely the best dog."

Though the initial training doesn't vary much with the path the dog is on, later training becomes tailored for their future job. During his early training, Wesley bonded with trainer Sara and learnt his key skills - nudging, pushing and head rest. These are all physical skills that could in future help an autistic child.

As part of his training, Wesley was out and about in the big wide world most days! Exploring new environments and learning to be comfortable in a range of settings is essential for an assistance dog. Our superstar took it all in his stride! He also got lots of downtime too, playing with his brothers at the training centre or going on a free run with Sara.

Eventually, Wesley was introduced to his brand new jacket. Again, Wesley was soon taking this all in his stride! Before long he was able to practice his road safety skills with two people, like he would be as a qualified assistance dog, and he rocked it!
