# Steps to fundraising success

### Decide what you ' want to do

Keep it fun and achievable; we are all motivated by different things, so the most important thing is that you enjoy yourself. Check out the next page if you're in need of inspiration.

# Set a date

Decide when and where your fundraiser will take place, taking into account the weather and activity always have a Plan B! It's a good idea to check what else may be going on in the area that may conflict with your event.

# **Get practical**

What do you need to be successful? Have you got the venue, the kit, or do you need additional support? Who's your target market? If you're recruiting friends and family to help, make a checklist and be clear with them what they can do to help.

# Spread the word

Tell your friends and family about your fundraising. Work colleagues may be particularly helpful, as some companies have a match funding scheme - it never hurts to ask. Get active on social media and email, and get out and about in the local community so that as many people as possible know about what you're doing.

### Finally have fun!

Enjoy your fundraising. It's a great chance to spend time with your friends, family and colleagues while feeling good about all your hard work.

### Things to consider when planning your event

### Food Hygiene

If you are handling or selling food, you must do so safely. Get the latest food hygiene regulations at food.gov.uk.



There are certain rules around raffles and lotteries that may be confusing; if you're unsure, please email <u>events@dogsforgood.org</u> or visit the Gambling Commission's <u>website</u>.

#### First Aid

The Red Cross or St John's Ambulance can provide guidance on providing first aid if you're hosting an event with lots of attendees. You'll need a minimum of two first aiders for events of 500 guests or more.

#### To ensure everyone's safety, you'll need to identify any potential hazards or risks at your event and how to deal with them. For guidance and a sample risk assessment, please email <u>events@dogsforgood.org</u>.

### **Data Protection**

Be aware of data protection when you're gathering contact details or taking photos. Only collect what you need, keep it safe, do not share it, only keep it as long as necessary and dispose of it securely (i.e. using a shredder) after. You'll need to have people's permission to take their photos at your event.

#### Collections

You'll need a licence from your local authority to carry out house-to-house or public street collections. If you're on private property, you'll need the permission of the manager.

#### Licences and permissions

Certain activities require a licence; if you're holding an event in a public place, your local authority will be able to advise. For events on private property, make sure you get permission in writing from the manager.

### **Big Night In**

Ask for a donation to attend a movie night, games night or dinner party. Boost your fundraising by holding food-related challenges alongside the main event.



#### Cake, anyone?

Could you give Mary Berry a run for her money? Hold a cake sale or auction, or hold challenges like 'guess the weight of the cake'... or challenge your friends to a bake-off!



#### **Promise Auction**

People can bid on chores they want doing - washing the car, doing the ironing, gardening etc. You can also approach local trades and ask for their services - hairdressers, mechanics, DIY. You'll need to find a venue and an auctioneer with a clear voice and a commanding presence!

#### Car Boot Sales

Make some space and raise some cash?! Perfect! A great summer fundraiser when there are car boots abound. Ask friends to donate items - clothing, books, homeware and even plants are all great options. You can find your local car boot by Googling 'car boots near me'.

#### **Guessing games**

These are great for fetes or fairs. How many sweets in a jar, how much does the cake weigh, or what's the name of the teddy? (You can find sheets of names online!). Ask people for a donation and the winner gets the sweets, cake or teddy!

#### Something silly

Sit in a bath of beans, hold a threelegged car wash, take a cream pie to the face or eat jelly with chopsticks... get people to sponsor you or charge participants to enter.

#### Quizzes & raffles

Select a date and venue, promote early and send out invites. Choose a format and topics for the quiz. A good quiz will have 60+ questions divided into rounds - plenty of inspiration can be found online! It's a bonus to get a charismatic quizmaster and arrange a prize for the winning team. Bonus funds can be raised by enforcing fines for people caught using their phones!

#### Worst shirt day

Add some fun to your work day! Challenge colleagues to see who can wear the ugliest or most unconventional shirt. Make it festive at Christmas and go for the ugliest Christmas jumper!

#### Get active!

Take on a fitness challenge. Walk, run, cycle, dance, skip, hula hoop... the possibilities are endless! Whether it takes hours, days or months - decide what you want to do and get people to sponsor you.

#### Sweepstakes

These are easy to organise, whether it's a TV game show or a sporting event. You can find templates and generators online.

#### Open garden

Proud of your garden? Why not host an open garden event to show off your lovely blooms and raise vital funds? This might take some advance planning to make sure your garden is looking its best. Check with your neighbours or local authority if you think there may be more cars than available parking. You can sell off surplus plants to raise extra funds.

# Dress for the occasion

Organise a dress-down or -up day at your work or club. Every participant makes a donation to take part; set a theme and the best (or worst!) dressed gets a prize.

# **Online Fundraising**

An online fundraising page is a great way of keeping your fundraising and all those supporting you up to date. It's easy to do and all donations made on the page are transferred directly to Dogs for Good so you don't have to do anything.

- 1. Go to the Dogs for Good JustGiving page at <u>justgiving.com/dogsforgood</u> and click the 'Fundraise for Us' button in the top right corner. If you're new to JustGiving, you'll be asked to set up an account.
- 2. You'll be offered the option of either taking part in an event or organising your own; choose whichever is applicable and follow the steps. It's very straightforward.
- 3. Once you've set up the event you can download a QR code which people will scan on their phones to be taken directly to your fundraising page - make sure to include this on any materials you produce!

#### Easy Fundraising

#### Facebook Fundraiser

Birthday coming up? Celebrate any occasion by setting up a Facebook fundraiser on your profile and nominating Dogs for Good as your chosen charity.

#### Don't forget to promote your event!

Your surrounding communities can be a huge help getting the word out about your fundraising. Put posters in shop windows, local clubs and community noticeboards and ask everyone you know to do the same.

Contact any 'what's on' guides and event listings publications and tell them what you're doing.

Speak to your local radio station or newspaper to tell what you're doing and why - give them interesting stats to capture their interest.

Get social! Create a hashtag for your event, set up a group or event on Facebook and get people to like or attend it. Post regular updates on your fundraising. Post key messages every day and make sure to share Dogs for Good's posts so they know who you're supporting.
